Is Christianity a Religion? -46

Calvin's **Predestination** underscored God's sovereignty in Jesus' mission, sparking debates on divine control and human freedom. The Sacraments were also reevaluated, with Luther retaining baptism and Eucharist, while Zwingli viewed them as symbolic. This period saw a seismic shift in understanding Jesus' mission, focusing on individual faith, biblical authority, and God's sovereign love, forever changing Western Christianity.

The Post-Reformation period (17th-18th centuries) saw the Church respond to Protestant challenges and internal renewal. The Counter-Reformation, sparked by the Council of Trent, reaffirmed Catholic traditions, sacraments, and papal authority, emphasizing Jesus' mission through these channels. Meanwhile, Evangelical Movements like Pietism (Germany) and Methodism (England) stressed personal conversion, heartfelt faith, and living out Jesus' teachings. As the Enlightenment dawned, rationalism and liberal theology led to varied interpretations of Jesus' mission, prioritizing reason and human experience. This era saw the Church grapple with tradition, renewal, and modernity's challenges, shaping diverse understandings of Jesus' mission in human history.

1. Martin Luther (1483-1546) :

Martin Luther (1483-1546), a German theologian and reformer, understood Jesus' mission in human history as a bold demonstration of God's love, where Jesus, the God-man, stepped into our messy world to take the hit for our sins. On the cross, He paid the ultimate price, absorbing the wrath of God's justice and extending mercy to a broken humanity. Luther saw this as the critical moment in history, where Jesus' obedience and sacrifice bridged the chasm between God and humans, making salvation a personal reality for those who trust in Him.

Conclusion

Pope Francis consistently teaches that recalling God's goodness is not a pious exercise but the very foundation that keeps our spiritual lives rooted, coherent, and directed toward our true end. When we deliberately remember how God has acted in our lives and in the history of salvation, we are returning to the source of our identity: we are a people loved first, called by grace, and sustained by gift. That act of remembrance does what memory is meant to do—it reorders our present by connecting it to our origin in God and our destiny in Him. Without it, we become spiritually adrift, like driftwood tossed by changing moods, fears, or cultural currents, because we have lost sight of who we are and where we are headed.

The Eucharist, in Francis's vision, is where this remembrance becomes most tangible and transformative. By giving thanks —_eucharistia_— and receiving Christ's self-gift under the signs of bread and wine, we do not merely recall God's goodness in our minds; we taste it, touch it, and are incorporated into it. The Eucharist roots us psychologically and spiritually by engaging our senses, reframing our story around unmerited grace rather than performance, and gathering us into communion so that gratitude moves from individual sentiment to shared life. Having been fed by pure gift, we are sent to become gift for others, which closes the circle: remembrance fuels gratitude, gratitude forms us into servants, and service deepens our awareness of God's goodness.

Thus, a life that regularly recalls God's goodness—especially in the Eucharist—is a life with a firm center. It gains coherence because every circumstance is seen within the larger story of God's faithful love; it gains meaning because our origin in grace and our destiny in communion give direction to daily choices; and it gains stability because gratitude anchors the heart against the drift of anxiety, entitlement, and despair. In Francis's words and in the lived experience of faith, remembrance is the compass that keeps us from drifting, the soil that steadies our roots, and the light that reveals both where we come from and where God is leading us. Consider how reminiscing about cherished moments with loved ones evokes feelings of connection, gratitude, and warmth.
